Students are expected to maintain a quality of achievement significantly above minimum UMKC standards for degree work. Individual student progress will be monitored throughout the program. Satisfactory progress is required of all students for retention in the program. Students are expected to maintain academic standards, perform satisfactorily in courses, refrain from academic dishonesty, comply with the established University and teacher education timetables and requirements, and refrain from unethical or unprofessional behavior or behaviors that obstruct the training process or threaten the welfare of the student or others. 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### **Curriculum Information specific to those pursuing a Master of Architecture at KSU:**

Students interested in pursuing this degree will complete the two-year curriculum sequence noted above. Having satisfactorily completed these courses and been accepted into the KSU M.Arch program, the student will then transfer to Kansas State University in their third year, to join the Master of Architecture sequence.

\*During the course of the Architectural Studies program, there are a minimum of nine (9) hours of general education electives required for UMKC students. During your entire academic career (at UMKC and KSU) pursuing a M.Arch degree, a minimum of twenty-eight (28) general elective credits are required, and must be taken outside of KSU's College of Architecture, Planning and Design. General electives may be taken in pursuit of a minor. Students may not take more than three (3) total hours of recreation credits toward graduation.

The Master of Architecture degree requires a minimum of twenty-four (24) hours of professional support electives (PSE): twelve (12) for undergraduate credit and twelve (12) for graduate credit. Of the undergraduate credits, at least three (3) hours must be planning elective credits, the other nine (9) are usually fulfilled in the 8th semester as part of the 4th-year study options. At least six (6) hours of the graduate level PSE must be architecture seminars. If you are attempting to take a professional support class at UMKC, students must consult closely with an advisor to be certain that the classes selected will count as professional support course work when they transfer to Kansas State University. Documentation is placed into the student's academic folder that clarifies how the course will be classified.

A required course, "Environmental Design and Society" (ARCH 325), normally taken in the fourth semester of study, is not offered at UMKC. It is acceptable to take this course at a later date, when you have transferred to KSU. ### **Curriculum Information specific to those pursuing a Master of Interior Architecture and Product Design at KSU:**

Students interested in pursuing this degree will complete the two-year curriculum sequence noted above. Having satisfactorily completed these courses and been accepted into the KSU IAPD program, the student will then transfer to Kansas State University in their third year, to join the Master of Interior Architecture and Product Design sequence. The Architectural Design Studios taken at UMKC will transfer as substitutes for the program's typical Interior Architecture and Product Design Studios. ### **Curriculum Information specific to those pursuing a Master of Landscape Architecture at KSU:**

Students interested in pursuing this degree will complete only the first-year curriculum listed above. Having satisfactorily completed these courses and been accepted into the KSU LA program, the student will then transfer directly to Kansas State University in their second year, to begin the Master of Landscape Architecture sequence.
